Sportfishing Notes

Smallmouth Bass

- Arvada has a good population of smallmouth bass.
- Traditional lures work well, especially during the pre-spawn period during mid to late April.

Rainbow Trout

- Trout fishing is generally good during the cooler months using traditional baits.
- Rainbow trout are stocked monthly March through September.

Walleye

- Arvada has a good population of walleye, some up to 25" in length (5 lbs).
- Fish early and late in the day for walleye.

Channel Catfish

- Arvada has a population of channel catfish approaching Master Angler size.
- Fish early and late in the day for catfish.

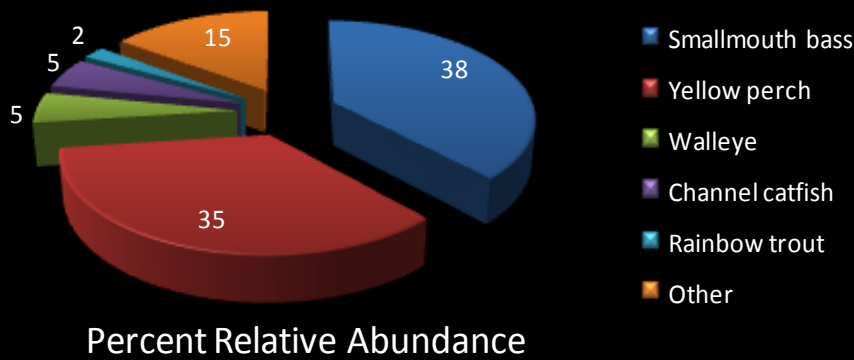


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Arvada Blunn Reservoir 2006 Fish Survey



The figure to the left shows the percent relative abundance of the most abundant species in Arvada Blunn Reservoir. Surveys here include the use of boat electrofishing and gill nets. The 2006 results show that smallmouth bass comprised the largest percentage (38%) of the species present, followed by yellow perch (35%), walleye (5%), channel catfish (5%), and rainbow trout (2%). Other species collected included spottail shiner (a good forage species) and white sucker. The abundance of forage species such as yellow perch and spottail shiner helps support healthy populations of predators.

The figure below shows the length frequencies of channel catfish, smallmouth bass, and walleye at Arvada Blunn Reservoir. The vertical bars represent the number of fish at a particular length. Channel catfish are typically difficult to collect with electrofishing and gillnets, so their relatively good showing in the collections indicates a robust population. Catfish up to 29" were collected (Master Angler length is 30"). Smallmouth showed a good range of sizes, with fish up to 18" collected.
